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# AT A GLANCE

- People can volunteer for animal welfare by helping at animal shelters, at wildlife centers, as citizen scientists, and at zoos.
- Animal shelters take care of stray and lost pets, helping them find homes. Volunteers may feed animals, do laundry, and socialize animals. They may also use their skills in social media, writing, or photography to help the shelter.
- Wildlife centers care for wild animals that are injured, sick, or orphaned. Volunteers take care of animals, do laundry, and support the veterinary staff at the center. They may get the chance to release the healed animals back into the wild.
- Citizen science is when everyday people get involved in collecting data for scientific projects. Volunteers in citizen science projects can help observe local wildlife, such as birds, frogs, and other species. This work can help scientists with conservation efforts.

# HOW CAN I VOLUNTEER AT AN ANIMAL SHELTER?

nimal shelters are places that care for animals and work to find homes for them. People may drop off a pet at a shelter if they are unable to care for it. The shelter may take in stray or lost animals. It may also take in animals that have been

mistreated. Shelters most commonly care

for dogs and cats. But some take in other

kinds of animals too, such as rabbits,

snakes, or birds.

Shelters vary widely. Some are made

up of one or two rooms and a handful

of **kennels**. Others are large, fancy facilities. They may play calming music to reduce stress for both animals and people. They may have features like fountains and pet supply shops to attract visitors.


Different shelters vary in how they are

run. Some are run by local governments.

### SHELTER OR RESCUE?

Animal shelters and animal rescues have similar missions. But they work differently. Animal shelters usually have their own buildings. A lot of people take care of the homeless pets and find people to adopt the animals. Animal rescues are usually based in one or more homes. The animals live with foster families. Rescues search for people who are a good fit to adopt the animals.
